### Day 1

**Read**: Romans 13:1-7; 1 Peter 2:13-17

**Introduction:** This passage clearly teaches that we ought to submit to our rulers. When you resist your rulers you are resisting God because He set up all authorities. The only exception given in scripture is when Peter was ordered not to continue teaching in the name of Christ (Acts 5:27-29). Peter replied, "we must obey God rather than men."

### Day 3

Read: Romans 14:1-4

Paul encourages us to accept each other, even though our consciences differ.
